BACKGROUND

The California Citizens Redistricting Commission (CRC) is responsible for redrawing Congressional, State Senate and Assembly, and Board of Equalization district boundaries once every ten years using data collected from the U.S. Census.

While the CRC has heard broadly from residents in nearby communities, the CRC is seeking more input from Oxnard residents and stakeholders. The CRC requested the opportunity to make a presentation to the City Council about the statewide redistricting process and the channels available to submit comments.

A representative from the CRC will make a presentation on the redistricting process for Congressional, State Senate and Assembly, and Board of Equalization district boundaries. Additional information regarding this process is also available at wedrawthelinesca.org.

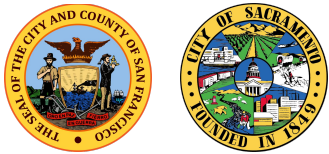

6 Line Drawing Criteria by Order

The Commission must follow these weighted criteria in this order when drawing district maps:

1 Equal Population Districts must be of equal population to comply with the US Constitution.	2 Voting Rights Act Districts must comply with the Voting Rights Act to ensure that minorities have an equal opportunity to elect representatives of their choice.	3 Contiguity Districts must be drawn so that all parts of the district are connected to each other.
4 Communities of Interest Districts must minimize the division of cities, counties, neighborhoods, and communities of interest to the extent possible	5 Geographically Compact Districts should be geographically compact such that nearby areas of population are not bypassed for more distant populations. This requirement refers to density, not shape.	6 Nesting Districts Where practicable each Senate District should be comprised of two complete and adjacent Assembly Districts and Board of Equalization districts shall be composed of 10 complete and adjacent State Senate Districts.

In addition, the place of residence of any incumbent or political candidate may not be considered in the creation of a map, and districts may not be drawn for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against an incumbent, political candidate, or political party.

Communities of Interest (COI)

- ▶ **Communities of Interest (COI)**--A community of interest is a concentrated population which shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.
- ▶ Examples include culture, areas in which the people share similar living standards, use the same transportation facilities, have similar work opportunities, or have access to the same media.
- ▶ People can belong to multiple communities of interest.
- ▶ Community of Interest is not the same as a district but are key building blocks of districts.

SUBJECT: Public Hearing regarding Redistricting of City Council Districts (15/30/30)

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council conduct a public hearing regarding the redistricting process for City Council districts and receive a presentation on the online and paper mapping tools that are available to encourage public participation in the City's redistricting process.

BACKGROUND

Every ten years, cities with by-district elections are required to use new census data to review and redraw district lines to reflect population changes. This process, called "redistricting", ensures that all districts within a city have nearly an equal number of people residing within each district.

Although the City recently went through the districting process, the Council districts created in 2018 reflected the population totals from the 2010 census. Under state law, public entities with elections in November 2022 have until April 17, 2022 in which to adopt district maps that reflect the changes in population indicated in the 2020 census (as modified by the State of California to reflect the original residency of persons incarcerated in California's prisons).

The City's redistricting process is a standalone process that is not connected to the redistricting that will occur at the state level (including for Congressional, Assembly, and state Senate districts) or at the County level (for the Supervisorial districts). The City's process will only address any necessary rebalancing of the Council district boundaries that will now occur once a decade after the U.S. Census.

Under recently adopted state laws (AB 849 and AB 1276), when the City Council goes through the redistricting process, the Council is required to draw and adopt boundaries using the following criteria in the listed order of priority:

1. Substantially equal in population for each of the districts.
2. Complies with the U.S. Constitution, the California Constitution and the federal Voting Rights Act.
3. Geographically contiguous.
4. Minimize the division of local neighborhoods and local communities of interest. (The law defines a "community of interest" as a population that shares common social or economic interests.)
5. Create district boundaries that residents can easily identify and understand. (These would include natural or artificial barriers, streets or the boundaries of the city.)
6. Districts that are compact in size.

7. District boundaries that are not adopted to favor or discriminate against a political party. (Elections Code Section 21601.)

Once the prioritized criteria are met, other traditional districting principles can be considered, such as minimizing the number of voters delayed from voting from 2022 to 2024; respecting voters' choices/continuity in office; and future population growth.

As part of the redistricting process, the City is required to hold at least four public hearings or workshops, with at least one of these public hearings or workshops held before any of the new district maps are drawn. At least one hearing must occur on a Saturday, Sunday, or after 6 p.m. on a weekday. If a redistricting hearing is held as part of a regular City Council meeting, the redistricting hearing portion must begin at a designated time. In addition, local public redistricting hearings are required to be made accessible to people with disabilities.

The City Council previously held two public hearings on redistricting on July 29, 2021 and September 30, 2021.

ANALYSIS

The purpose of tonight's public hearing is to inform the public about the redistricting process and provide a presentation on the online and paper mapping tools that are now available on the City's redistricting webpage (<https://www.oxnard.org/redistricting>). The mapping tools were released online on November 22, 2021, with subsequent public outreach to inform the public that these mapping tools are now available.

The online mapping tool (DRA 2020) is a web-based application to create, view, analyze, and share redistricting maps. DRA 2020 includes demographic data from the 2020 census, the 2019 five-year estimate of CVAP (Citizen Voting Age by Race and Ethnicity) based upon the American Community Survey, and extensive election data. The City's demographer has created map templates for the public to use to draw proposed district boundaries for the City's six Council districts. The City's redistricting webpage includes specific instructions, including a user guide, to explain how to use this online tool.

The paper map tools allows residents and interested parties to hand draw maps using a paper map that is included on the City's website with specific population information for designated areas of the City. Alternatively, residents and interested parties may submit maps created using the Excel supplement available on the City's website. Using an Excel spreadsheet, interested parties can assign each area on the map to one of the six Council districts by referencing the ID numbers shown on the map. Submitted papers maps will be reviewed by the City's demographer and will then posted on the City's website for review by the public.

The paper mapping tools are available in both English and Spanish.

After tonight's public hearing, four additional redistricting public hearings have been scheduled. The dates of these public hearings are as follows:

Public Hearing #4: Thursday, January 6, 2022
Public Hearing #5: Saturday, January 22, 2022
Public Hearing #6: Tuesday, February 1, 2022
Public Hearing #7: Wednesday, February 16, 2022.

The legal deadline for the City to adopt a new map is April 17, 2022, with the first election with the new map to occur on November 8, 2022.

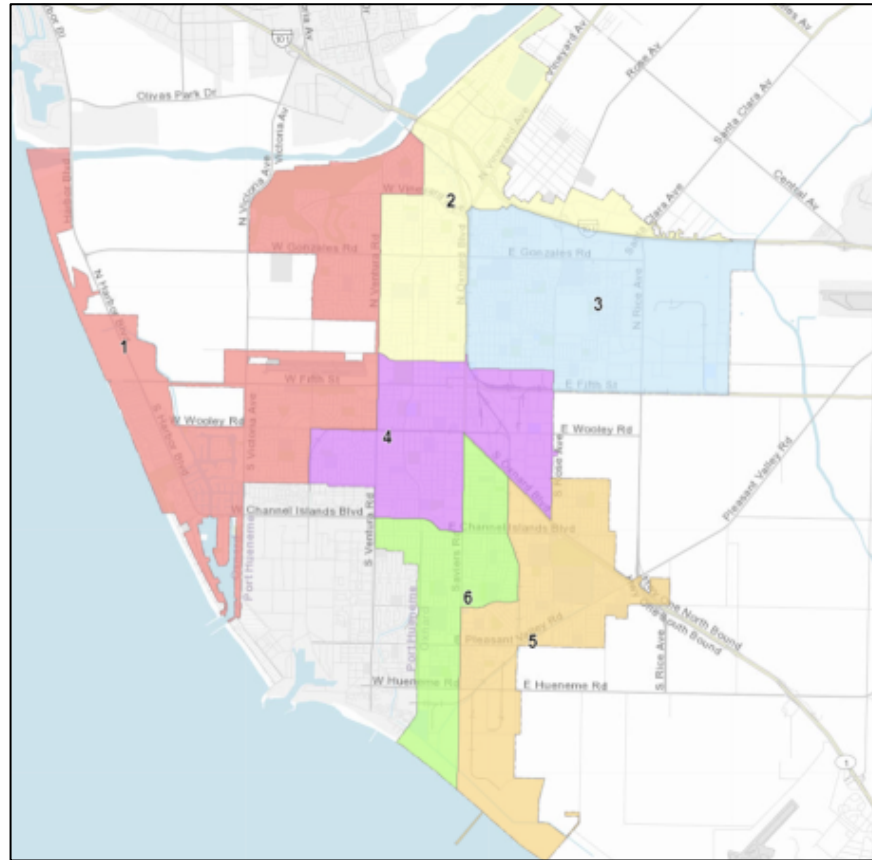

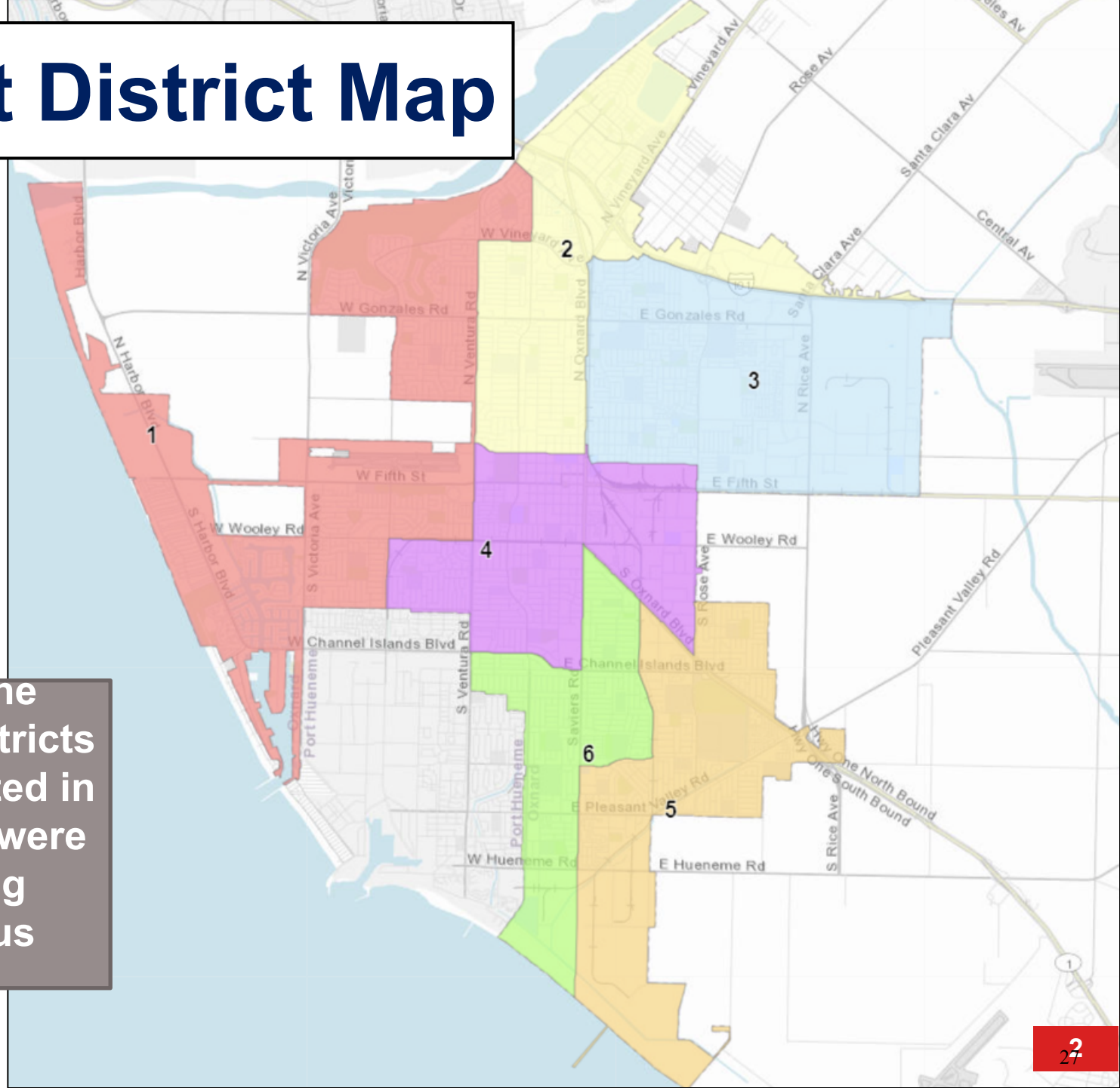

Calculating Population Deviation

Ideal district size = 33,769

- Calculated by dividing the total population by the number of districts
- $202,614/6 = 33,769$

Total deviation = 6,743

- Calculated by subtracting the smallest district's population from the largest district's population
- $39,136 \text{ (D2)} - 32,393 \text{ (D6)} = 6,743$

Total deviation % = 19.97%

- Calculated by dividing the total deviation by the ideal district size
- $6,743/33,769 = 19.97\%$

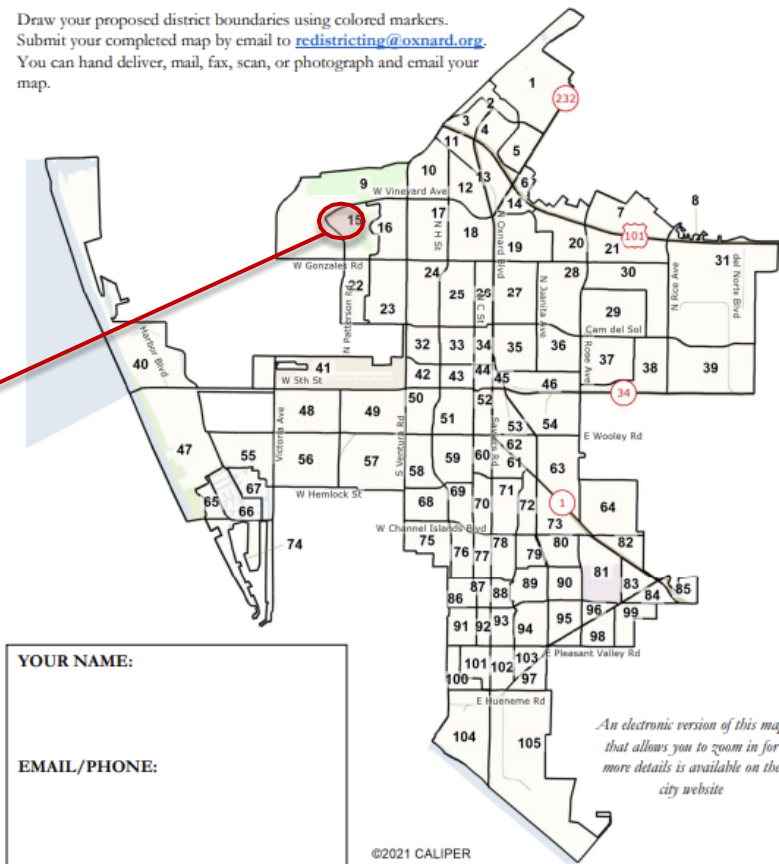

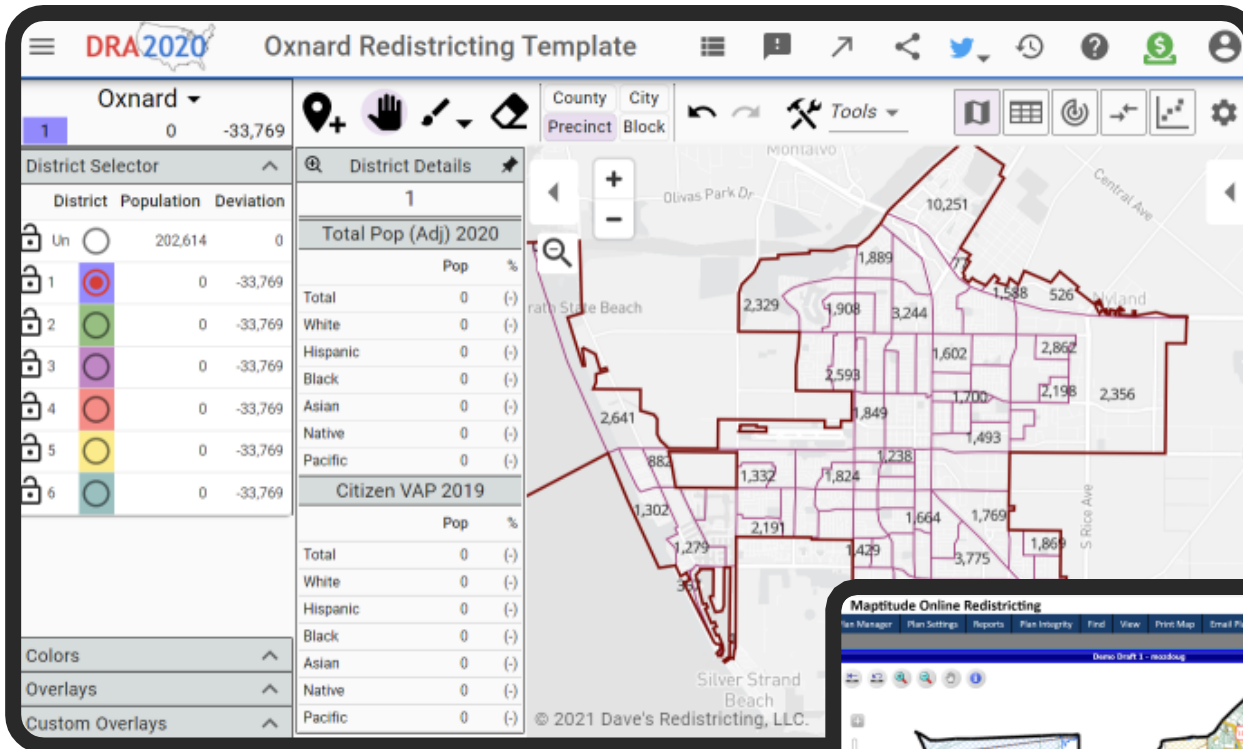

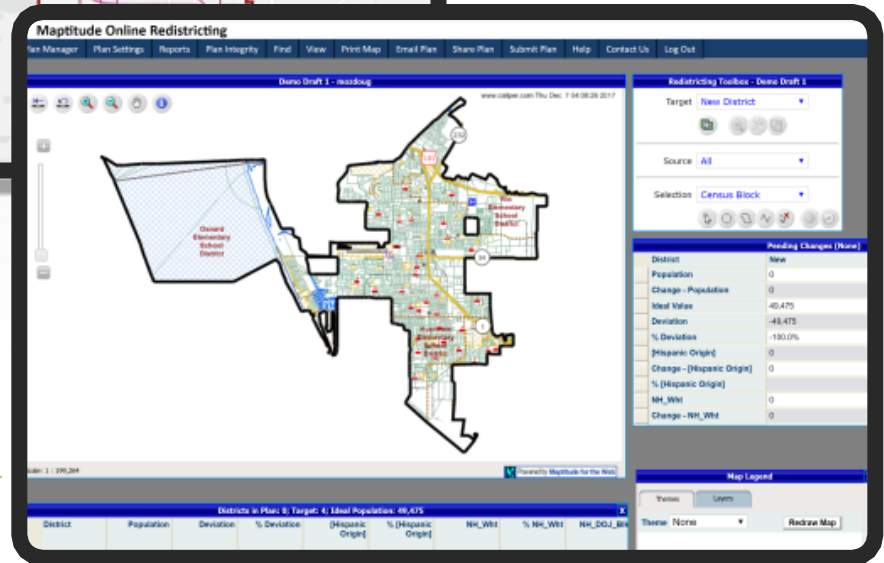

City of Oxnard Redistricting Process

Every ten years, local governments use new census data to redraw their district lines to reflect how local populations have changed. [Assembly Bill 849 \(2019\)](#) requires cities and counties to engage communities in the redistricting process by holding public hearings and/or workshops and doing public outreach, including to non-English-speaking communities.

This is a rebalancing exercise to ensure equal representation throughout the City.

In Oxnard, the City Council is responsible for drawing council districts. Redistricting is done using U.S. Census data, which is anticipated to be released around mid-August 2021. For the City of Oxnard, the redistricting process must be completed by April 17, 2022.
